Throughout this May and June, the Virginia FFA Foundation partnered with Virginia Produce Company and Harris Teeter to raise funds for scholarships and grants for Virginia FFA members interested in pursuing a career in production agriculture. Harris Teeter sold sweet corn from Virginia Produce Company at their stores and donated a portion of the proceeds to Virginia FFA. This partnership raised \$18,000 this year and the check was presented at the 96th Annual Virginia FFA State Convention. The scholarship recipients this year included James Tompkins from the Carroll County FFA Chapter, Austin Funk from the Broadway FFA Chapter, and Jackson Lohr from the Broadway FFA Chapter. Congratulations to these recipients!

The opportunity came into conversation in May 2022 when VDACS Commissioner, Joe Guthrie recognized the opportunity for a partnership. Mr. Moir Beamer, CEO of Virginia Produce Company had a long relationship with Harris Teeter and wanted to implement a program similar to G & R Farms' program through National FFA.

In a recent article from Produce Blue Book; Moir Beamer, CEO of Virginia Produce Company said, "It was so rewarding to use our business to help invest in FFA members and know that we are helping them financially as they begin their studies in college. With the challenges we're all experiencing from the farm all the way down to the grocery store, the whole supply chain needs to support our agriculture students. They're who will be growing the food we need to feed the future generations."

During this past summer, Virginia FFA helped to promote the program through online communications and by bringing FFA members and State Officers to participating stores in order to give a face behind the program. This program is planned to continue and possibly expand to include other funding for additional programs through Virginia FFA. 

Gearing Up

Have you ever wondered how our State Officer team is trained for their year of service? The 2022-2023 State Officer Team spent the beginning of their term in various trainings to prepare for the upcoming year!

On July 11th through July 15th, the newly elected Virginia FFA State Officer team traveled to Graves Mountain Lodge in Syria, Virginia to begin their first training session. The first official training is more commonly referred to as ‘Base Camp’ and is led by a facilitator from National FFA. The team had the amazing opportunity to learn from Mr. Rodrigo Ramirez-Perez. 


